The Public Address System and the Student Notice Board were used to inform students and give awareness about student support services such as Career Guidance Cell, Placement Cell and Grievance Redressal Cell, fee deduction etc. as and when necessary. The Student Handbook and the College Website facilitated the dissemination of information regarding student support services such as hostel facilities, scholarships, canteen etc. Class Teachers were directed to identify the outstanding students from various classes of the first year UG batch to be mentored across three years by internal faculty and external resource persons as part of the Walk With a Scholar (WWS) Programme, a Govt. of Kerala initiative. Class Teachers were directed to identify the weak students from various classes of the first year UG batch to be mentored across one year by internal faculty members as part of the Student Support Programme (SSP), a Govt. of Kerala initiative. More than hundred scholarships are provided to students who excel in studies, cultural and sports activities. SAS Care foundation and Japan (Japanese Malayali Association) provides scholarship to meritorious students who have financial troubles. The final year UG students are given career Guidance programme. Orientation Programme for students, Parent teacher meetings, Awareness classes on different topics, Bank Test Coaching, Civil Service Coaching, and Net Coaching classes are conducted. Also students are encouraged to participate in various club activities. Talented students are encouraged to take part in competitions organised in other Colleges/ Institutions

Yes, The College is owned and managed by St. George Forane church, Edathua, with the Arch Bishop of Changanassery as the Patron. The vicar of the parish is the president of the governing body of the college. The principal of the college is the secretary to the managing Board. The other members are three representatives from the parish, one member representing the faculty, the college bursar and the vicar of the Lourde Matha parish church.
